





"Come on gang, I think I found it," says Brent Smith jokingly as he and Joann Downs lead the graduates in the processional.





As the new principal, Mr. Ralph Marshall had the hard task of acquainting himself with the teachers, the school, and the community. He works with Dr. Earl Blemker, general superintendent, in planning the new school and all administrative policy. Under Dr. Blemker are Mr. Donson and Mr. Porter, assistant superintendents. They are also on the scene when there is some decision making to do.

Mr. Brenton, the junior high principal, is entirely responsible for the seventh and eighth grades. Together he and Mr. Marshall spend a great deal of their time directing traffic in the lunch room. Additional tasks include keeping the halls clear of loiterers and continuing school policy for North Central Accredidation.









Science and mathematics stress Scientific methods of inquiry




Following in the wake of Euclid, Newton and Gauss, Greenwood mathematicians and scientists, learned the importance of rigid, logical reasoning. In realizing the importance of computers in today's world, they organized a computer class in which they studied the operation and programmed Indiana Central's "thinking" machines. After algebra I, geometry, biology and physical science those wanting to go to college had available them more advanced courses. In these classes were opportunities to acquire more complex and specialized knowledge, applicable in a world fast becoming one of higher educational standards.

As a "future investment" the business section of the curriculum prepares students for careers, prepares the collegebound for assignments and enables future independents to manage their finances. Through the subjects of general business, bookkeeping, shorthand, typing, office practice, business law, business English and business math, girls and boys alike are trained to fill secretarial, bookkeeping and accounting positions. They are skilled enough to take quick notes in class and to type their assignment, both necessities in college. Also as teens graduate from high school, they begin to strike out on their own, to live independently and to think in terms of a family. With a knowledge of how our economic system operates and how to cope with it, they can more readily manage their money and make a success of their financial life.




























