



## Jay-Vees, Li'l W-men Compile Winning Marks







## Matmen Tussle to Set Record of 9 Victories

Harold Lawson's matmen wrestled their way to the best record in the school history, that of 9--3. Another school record broken this year, that of the highest score in a dual meet, came about during the Greenwood vs. Franklin which ended with a 42--10 mark. In the meet against Shelbyville Mike Cunningham pinned his man in only fifteen seconds. Grappling provides an opportunity for the student to get away from his studies, further build his physique, and develop coordination all at the same time.

In the Johnson County Meet Scott Bergman, Mike Hurst, and Mickey James won championships in their weight classes of 137, 145, and 155 respectively. Greenwood's wrestlers earned second place with 86 points over all, losing only to Whiteland High School by seven points.


For the first time, Greenwood was able to send a member of the wrestling team to the Regional. Mike Hurst placed second, wrestling at 145 lbs.

## Foxy Reserves Attach Impetus to the Future


Coach Whitson's grapplers ended the 1969-1970 wrestling season with a final record of 7--5.







Basketball, back in style at Greenwood after a drought of four years, really got rolling this year. Next year should be even better with only four seniors leaving.



During the G-Wood Whiteland game David Steele avidly concentrates upon a free throw.







## Thinlies County Champs; Crail Vaults to Title



# Golfers, Tennis Team Diversify G-wood Athletes




To return the ball in a strategic place in the court is Jim Royce's objective.



Mrs. Collins sponsored the varsity and reserve cheerleaders this year while Mrs. Thompson led the freshmen.






## Top Scholar Addresses Seniors on the Freedom: Responsibility












## Marching Band Builds Shows on Big Sound






## Foreign Habitat Flaunts Desire for Expedition





## Administrators Anticipate New Facilities Use









## Social Studies Classes View Current Issues



## Lectures, Term Papers, Novels Frame English

Through daily exercises and projects students of the English language learned the keys to better self-expression. The English Department emphasized the development of skills in reading, writing, and speaking. Grammar courses strengthened writing ability. 




## Math, Science Classes Define Technical Data










## Section Goals Include County Business Meet





## Outdoor Activity Eases Packed Gym Conditions




## Industrial Arts Faculty Shifts Make Changes


# Concessions, Class Rings Comprise Junior Mania



One complex facet of junior high is that of scheduling. This is the duty of counselor Mrs. Ring. The first step is that of grouping the students according to their basic subjects; math, science, and english. In each subject Mrs. Ring classifies the student after checking their percentile and their motivation. Ability charts and grades earned in class give her this information. At this point all teachers are given a chance to evaluate the student. The information thus far compiled is placed on computer sheets by Mrs. Ring. These are then given to Mrs. Smith, secretary, to be typed onto IBM sheets for scheduling.

The lengthy method must be completed for all students entering 6th, 7th, or 8th grade each year.







# Organizations Occupy Time Before—After School








