


Battle Cry of Freedom: The Civil War Era by James M. McPherson – 973.7 MCP; eBook on eIndiana*

Filled with fresh interpretations and information, puncturing old myths and challenging new ones, this fast-paced narrative fully integrates the political, social, and military events that crowded the two decades from the outbreak of one war in Mexico to the ending of another at Appomattox.




<u>Confederates in the Attic: Dispatches from the Unfinished Civil War</u> by Tony Horwitz – 973.7 HOR in print, Large Print, & on CD; eBook on <u>eIndiana</u>*;

When prize-winning war correspondent Tony Horwitz leaves the battlefields of Bosnia and the Middle East for a peaceful corner of the Blue Ridge Mountains, he thinks he's put war zones behind him. But awakened one morning by the crackle of musket fire, Horwitz starts filing front-line dispatches again this time from a war close to home, and to his own heart.

Presents a portrait of the Civil War general and eighteenth president, challenging the views of his critics while sharing insights into his prowess as a military leader, the honor with which he conducted his administration, and the rise and fall of his fortunes.



<u>Grant and Sherman: The Friendship That Won the Civil War</u> by Charles Bracelen Flood – 973.73 FLO; available on audio on <u>hoopla</u>*

Profiles the lives, careers, and friendship of Ulysses S. Grant and William Tecumseh Sherman, and chronicles their failures and successes, families, political hurdles, and their shrewdness in battle that eventually led to a Union victory during the Civil War.



<u>Team of Rivals: The Political Genius</u> by Doris Kearns Goodwin – BIO LINCOLN in print & on CD; available on audio via <u>elndiana</u>*


This multiple biography is centered on Lincoln's mastery of men and how it shaped the most significant presidency in the nation's history. Historian Goodwin illuminates Lincoln's political genius, as the one-term congressman rises from obscurity to prevail over three gifted rivals to become president.




<u>Women of the War: Their Heroism and Self-Sacrifice: True Stories of Brave Women in the</u> <u>Civil War</u> by Frank Moore – 973.7 MOO

This book tells of the true stories of brave women who followed their husbands and brothers to the fields of battle and even became prisoners of war.

<u>The Assassination of Abraham Lincoln</u> – DVD 973.7 ASS; available on <u>hoopla</u>* This American experience film recounts a great American drama: two tumultuous months when the joy of peace was shattered by the heartache of Lincoln's death. At the heart of the story are two figures who define the extremes of character: Lincoln, who had the strength to transform suffering into infinite compassion, and Booth, who allowed hatred to curdle into destruction.



The Civil War by Ken Burns – DVD 973.7 CIV discs 1-7

Ken Burns's Emmy Award-winning documentary brings to life America's most destructive and defining conflict. The Civil War is the saga of celebrated generals and ordinary soldiers, a heroic and transcendent president and a country that had to divide itself in two in order to become one.
