

Ask a North Korean: Defectors Talk about Their Lives Inside the World's Most Secretive Nation by Daniel Tudor – 362.87 TUD; eBook on hoopla*


The long-running "Ask a North Korean" column produced by NK News in Washington D.C. invites readers to ask questions of recent North Korean defectors about everyday issues that are not generally discussed in the media. Various aspects of life in North Korea are discussed in this book through a series of interviews . These interviews show that even in the world's most authoritarian regime, there is still a degree of normality and continuity.



The Great Leader and the Fighter Pilot: The True Story of the Tyrant Who Created North Korea and the Young Lieutenant Who Stole His Way to Freedom by Blaine Harden – 951.904 HAR

Drawing on documents from Chinese and Russian archives about the role of Mao and Stalin in Kim's shadowy rise, as well as from never-before-released U.S. intelligence and interrogation files, Harden gives us a heart-pounding escape adventure and an entirely new way to understand the

world's longest-lasting totalitarian state.



<u>Korea: An Introduction</u> by James Hoare and Susan Peras – 951.9 HOA Examines the history and people of Korea, and describes their society, language, customs, and religions.



On Hallowed Ground: The Last Battle for Pork Chop Hill by Bill McWilliams – 951.904 MCW

Evoking all the powerful emotions of a frustrating, bitter, bloody, stalemated Korean War, Bill McWilliams takes readers into the trenches and bunkers of Pork Chop Hill with the men of the 7th Infantry Division's 17th and 32nd Regiments as they withstand repeated assaults by the Chinese in July 1953.



A Short History of the Korean War by James L. Stokesbury – 951.9 STO

Stokesbury summarizes the major events of the Korean War, surveys the world situation in the early 1950s, and details the war's effect on American domestic affairs.

Meet some pivotal figures of Korean mythology: the mythical culture hero Mireuk and his rival Seokga, the legendary king Hyokkose of Silla, and the self-sacrificing magistrate Pak Che-sang. Consider the porous border between mythology and history, and learn a trick for telling which myths have been altered by scholars.



<u>Silence Broken: Korean Comfort Women</u> – https://tinyurl.com/yxd6t39d (available on Kanopy*)

A powerful and emotional documentary about Korean women forced into sexual servitude by the Japanese Imperial Army during World War II, Silence Broken dramatically combines

the testimony of former comfort women who demand justice for the "crimes against humanity" committed against them, along with contravening interviews of Japanese soldiers, recruiters and contemporary scholars who deny the existence of comfort women or claim that these victims "did this for money."
