<b>4 SINGING</b>  Sing "good morning" using the Happy Birthday song. <i>Good morning to you, good morning to you. good morning (child's name), good morning to you.</i>	<b>5 COUNTING</b>  Work with your child to draw an imaginary monster. Ask your child how many arms, eyes, teeth? What color?	<b>6 READING</b>  Go to the library and take out a new book. Talk about new words you come across while reading the new book.	<b>7 WRITING</b>  Write a grocery list together. Walk around the kitchen checking what you might need and add it to the list.	<b>1 WRITING</b>  Look out the window with your child and create a list of everything you see, using both pictures and words. <i>(Instructions are on the back. ↗)</i>	<b>2 PLAYING</b>  Make your own masks and use them in play. <i>(Instructions are on the back. ↗)</i>	<b>3 TALKING</b>  Talk about the weather today and what you should wear to go outside. 
<b>11 COUNTING</b>  Trace the hand of each person in your family. Whose hand is bigger? Whose is smaller?	<b>12 READING</b>  Spot letters on license plates today. Call them out as you see them. 	<b>13 WRITING</b>  Write your child's name in big letters. Decorate the page and hang it where they can see it.	<b>14 PLAYING</b>  Play "I Spy" with rhyming words. <i>I spy with my little eye something that rhymes with pie. What is it? Yes, Sky!</i>	<b>8 PLAYING</b>  Take a walk outside. Collect colorful leaves. Try to find as many different types as possible.	<b>9 TALKING</b>  Use interesting new words. For example, <i>delightful</i> in place of <i>good</i> ; <i>voracious</i> in place of <i>hungry</i> ; <i>scrumptious</i> in place of <i>delicious</i> .	<b>10 SINGING</b>  Take turns singing bits of the alphabet song. 
<b>18 READING</b>  Hold a favorite book upside-down or start reading it backwards. Talk about what is "wrong" with the way you are reading the book.	<b>19 WRITING</b>  Work together to plan a walk around your neighborhood. Draw a map before you go and use it while you are walking.	<b>20 PLAYING</b>  Play "restaurant." Create a menu together. 	<b>21 TALKING</b>  Use interesting expressions. <i>I'm all ears</i> in place of <i>I'm listening</i> .	<b>15 TALKING</b>  Together draw a picture of a bus. Create a short story about the bus's journey. Where is it going? Why are the passengers getting on and off?	<b>16 SINGING</b>  Sing "Five Little Speckled Frogs." <i>(Words are on the back. ↗)</i>	<b>17 COUNTING</b>  Pick a point in your house or on your block. Count the steps to get there. 
<b>25 WRITING</b>  Write a list of words that rhyme with dog. 	<b>26 PLAYING</b>  Play a rhyming riddle game. <i>What do you see that rhymes with bee?</i> <i>Yes, a tree!</i>	<b>27 TALKING</b>  Smell different things and talk about them: spices, flowers, fruit, and cocoa. Which scents do you like or dislike?	<b>28 SINGING</b>  Dance to a fast song and then dance to a slow song. Clap along to both songs.	<b>29 COUNTING</b>  Roll a die. Count the dots each time.	<b>30 READING</b>  Read a book about Halloween.	<b>31 WRITING</b>  Draw a giant letter and drive a toy car along it.

## Parents are tremendous role models.

If your children see that you think reading is important and enjoy it, they will follow your lead. When you go to the library, check-out books for you and your children. Put your books somewhere at home where your child can see them. Let your children see you reading. Talk about what you've read, even if it is just to say, "That was a good book. I liked reading it."
