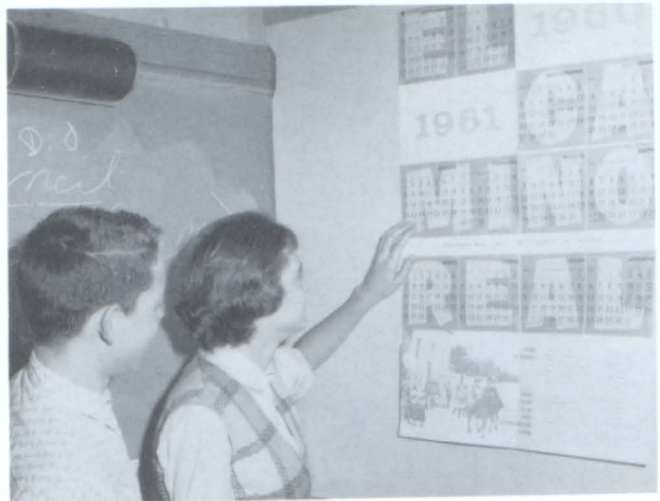

Foreign languages here have become very popular. Two years of Latin and two years of Spanish were offered this year. Next year a third year of Spanish and a third year of Latin will be added to our curriculum.

Offered in science are Physics, Chemistry, General Science, and Biology which is required of all students. The interest in science has increased, and the classes are growing each year. But with our new science laboratory which was constructed this year, facilities will be adequate.

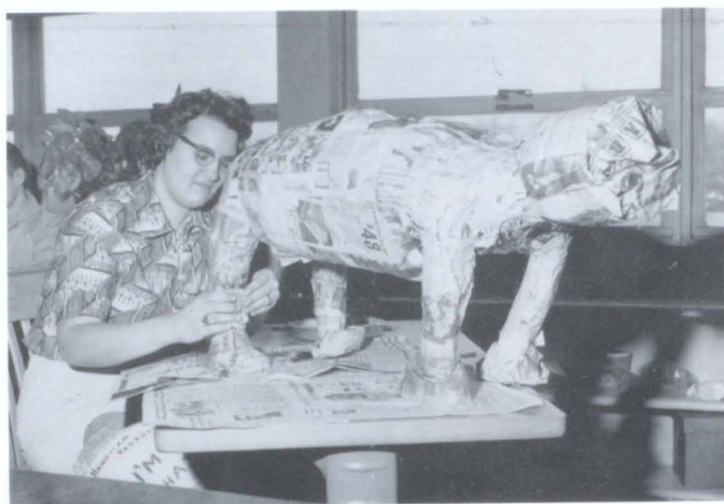

This year the girls have gone to a style show as well as increasing their knowledge of clothing and nutrition.



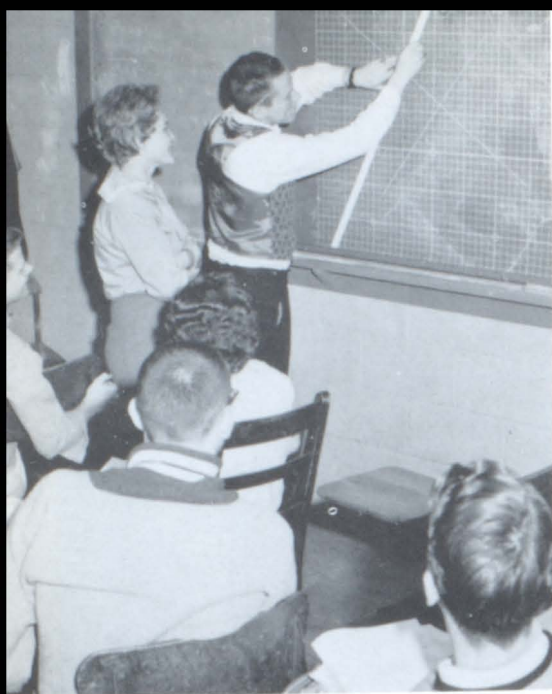

Industrial Arts is offered to junior and senior high school students to give vocational training in mechanics, wood work and related fields.

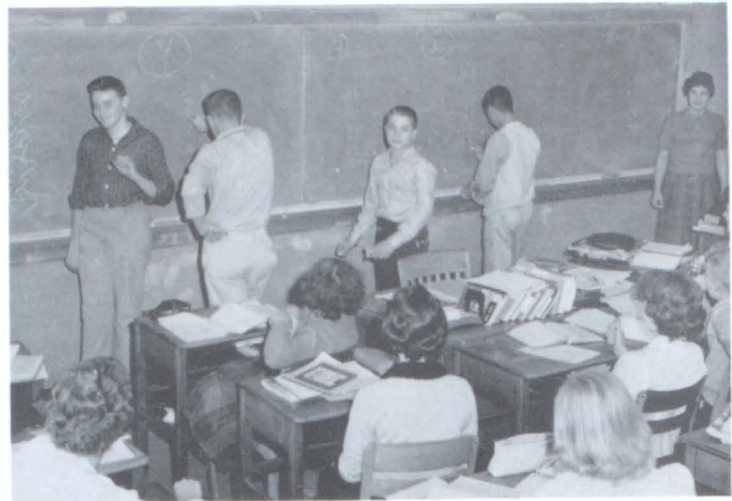

Driver Training is offered to teach students the correct manner of safe driving, and all the rules and regulations of it.





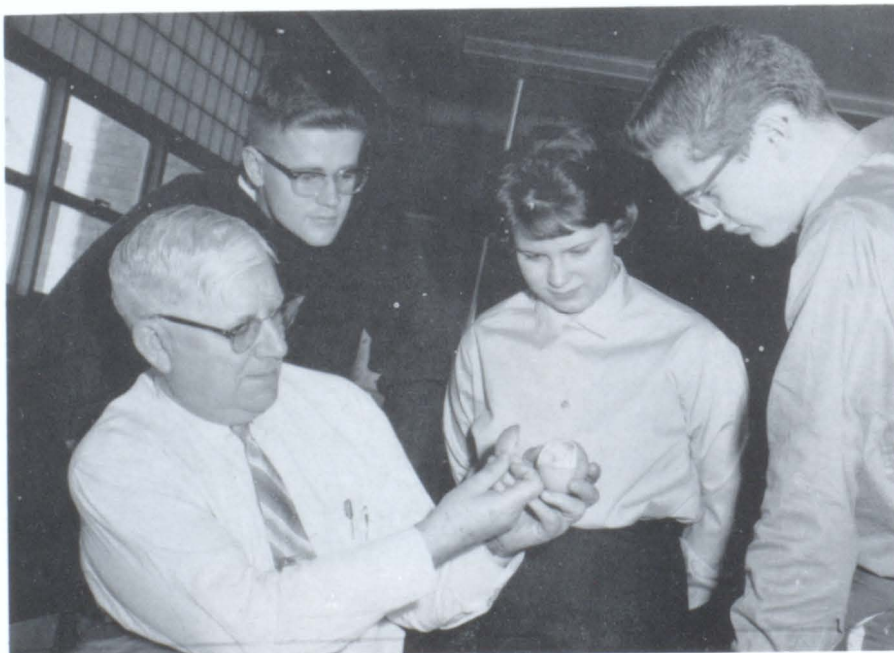

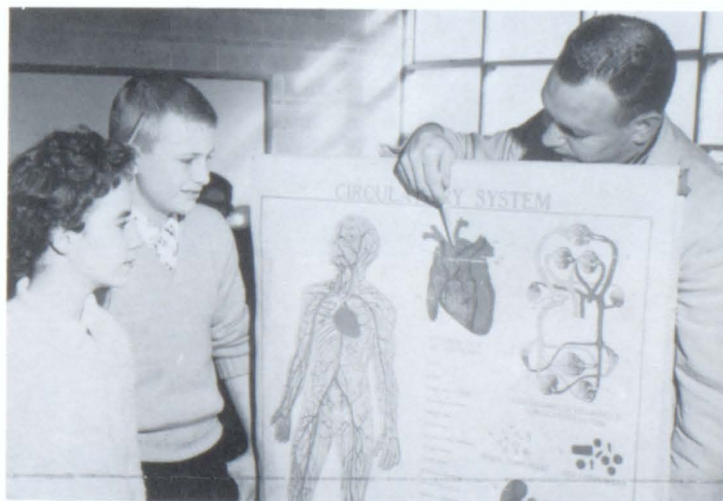

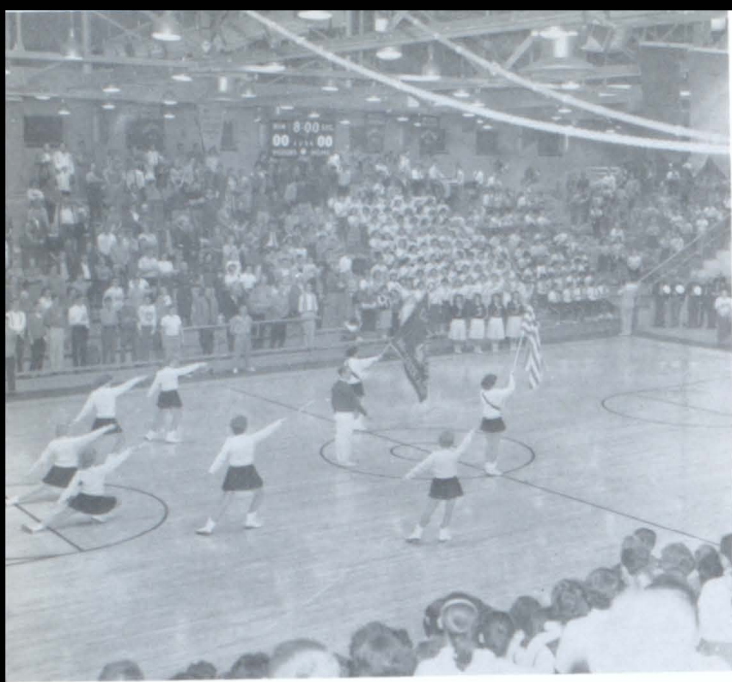

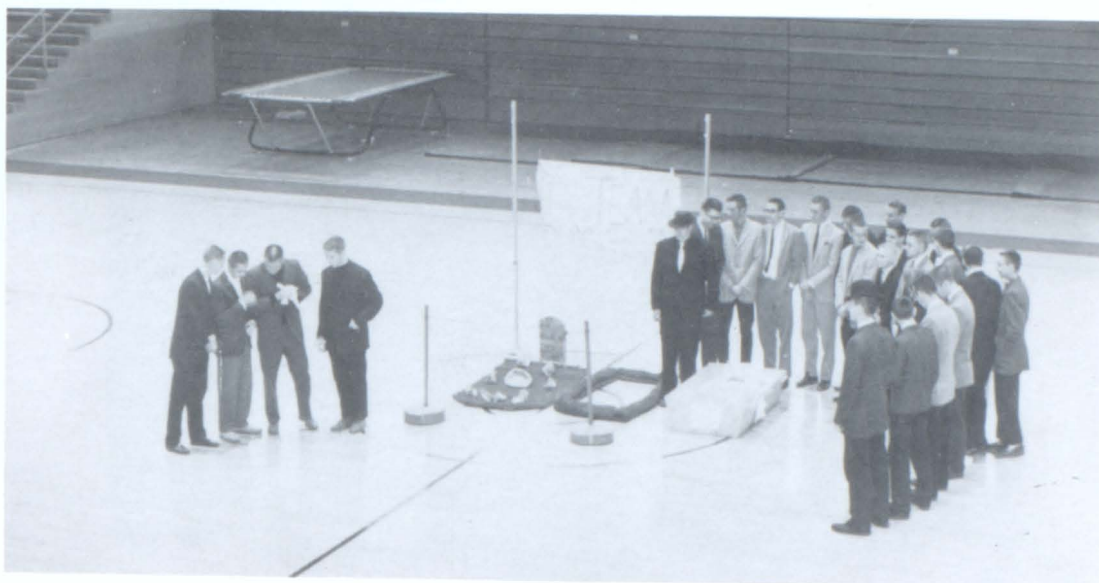

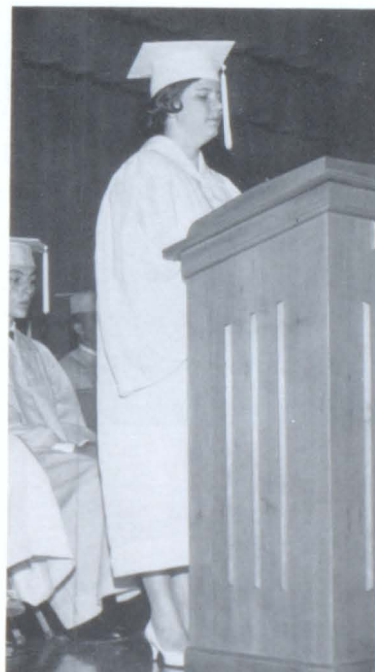

Both clubs together put out a roar that would boost the spirits of any basketball player. This helped to lead to a very successful season.



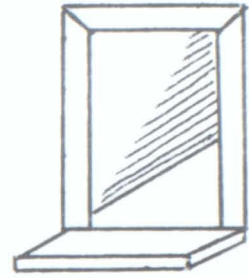

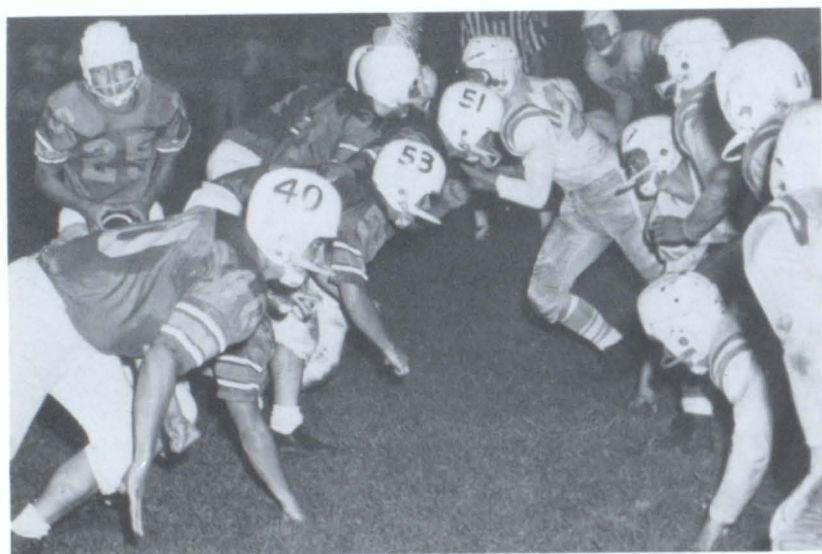

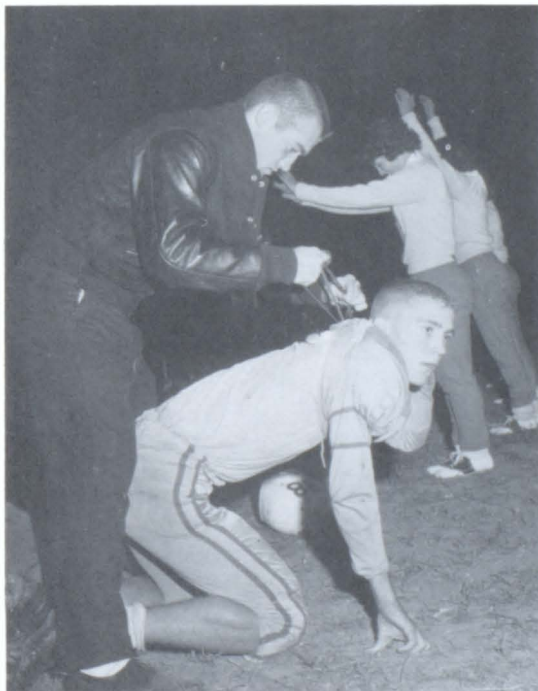

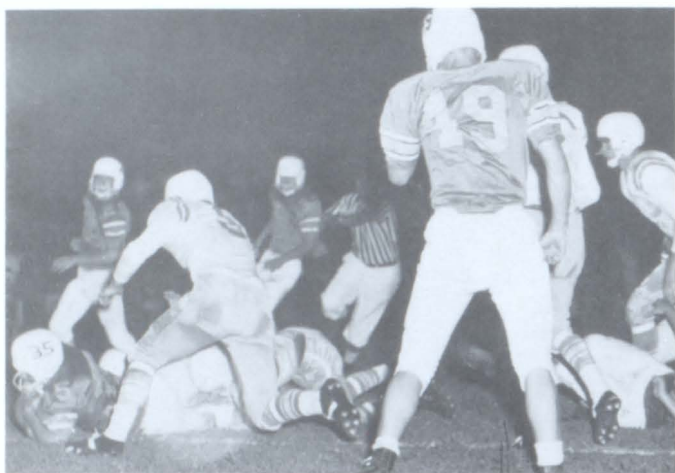

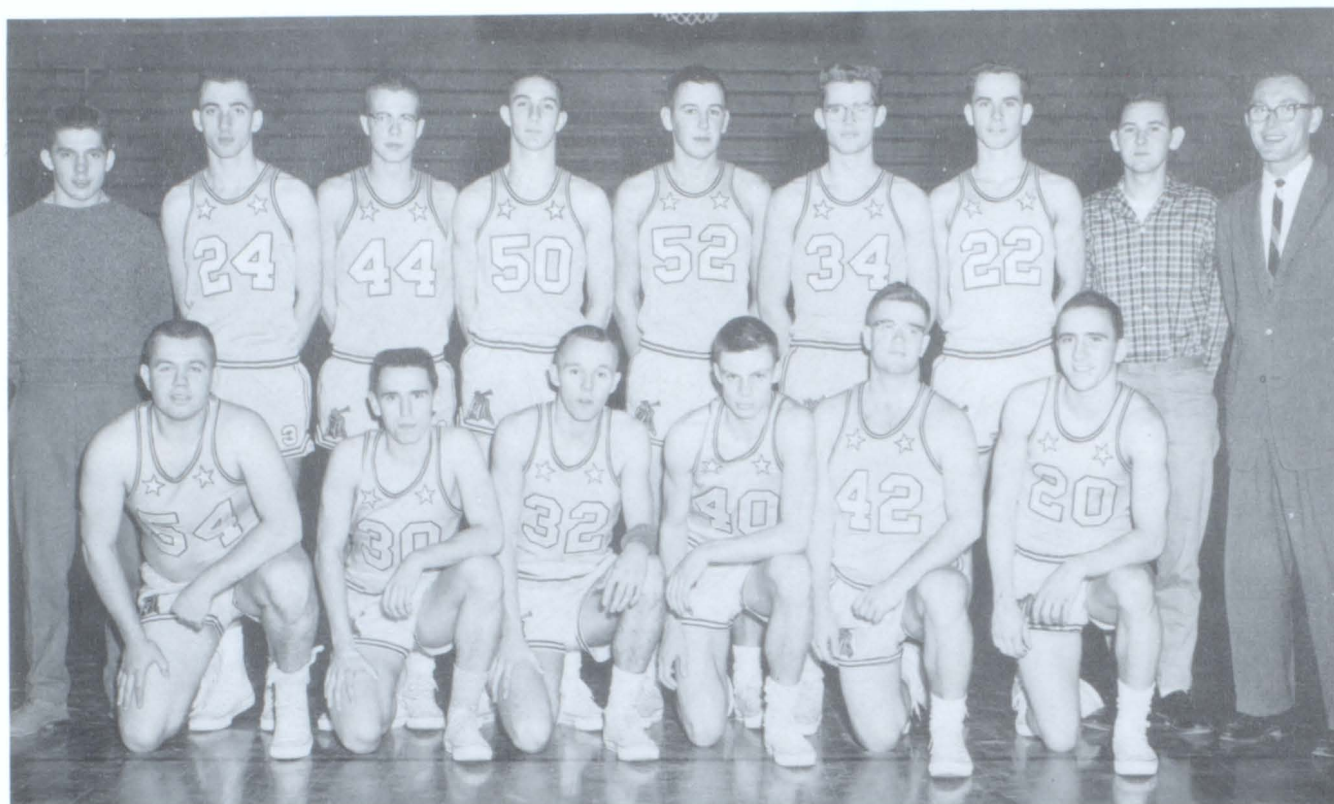

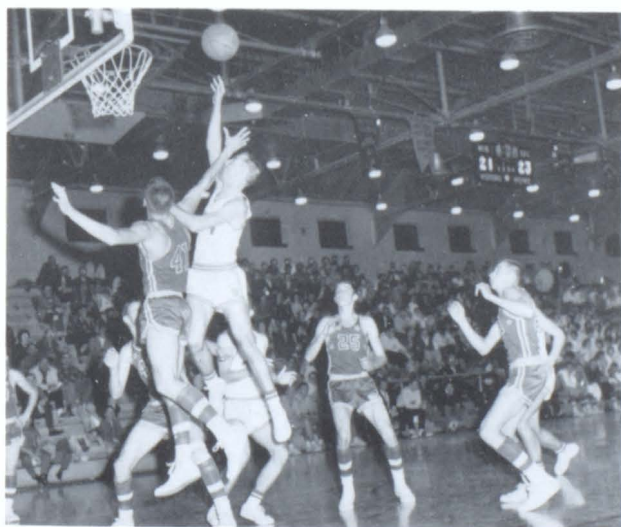

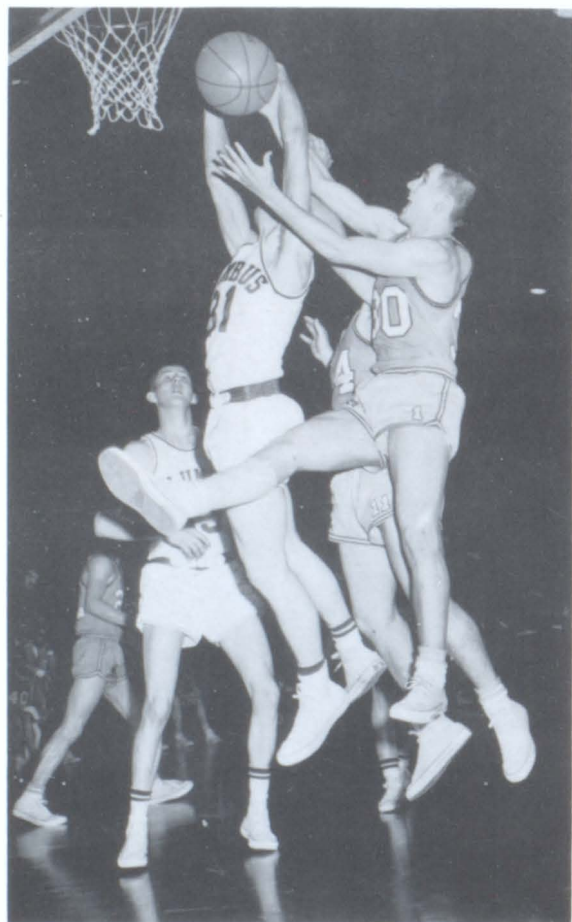

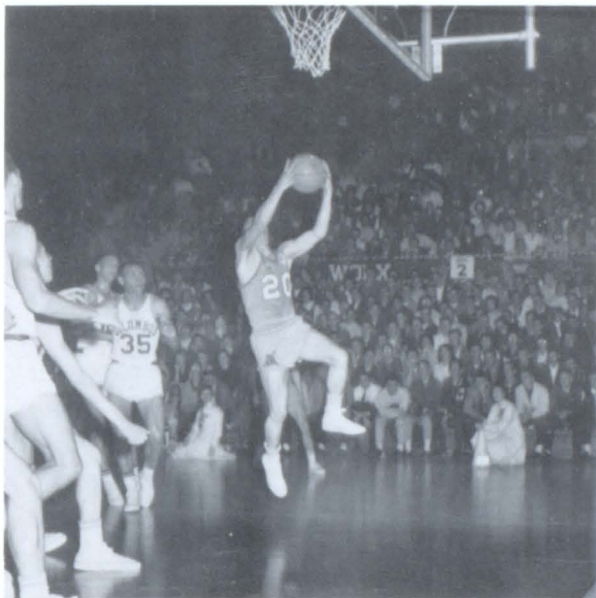

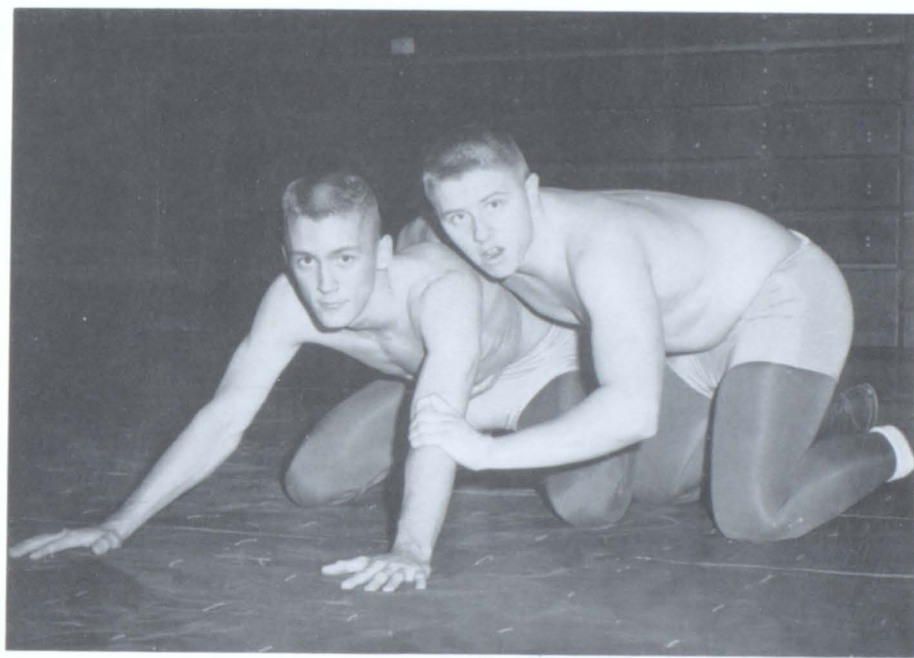
INITIAL WRESTLING RECORD NOTABLE

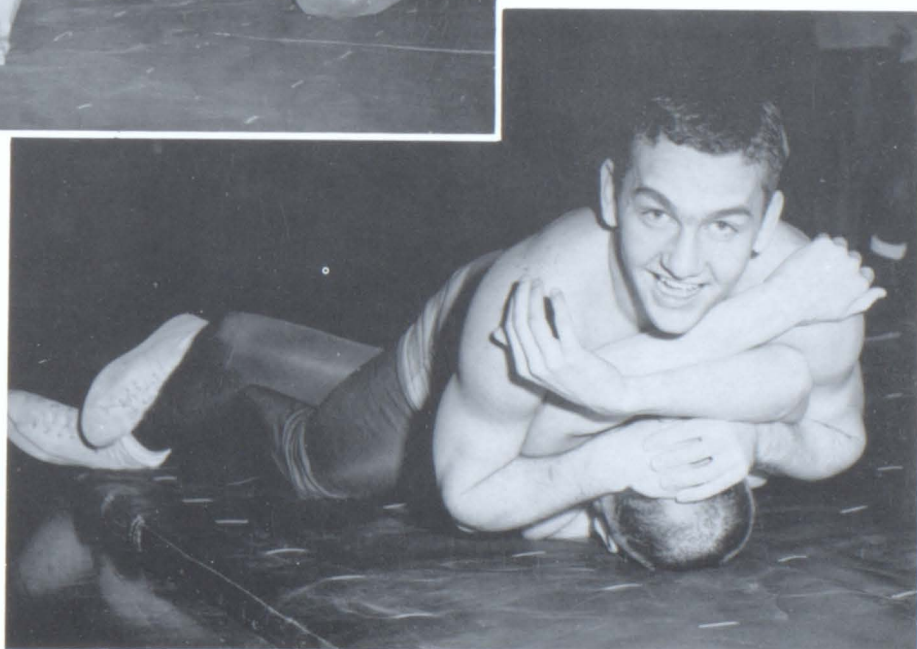

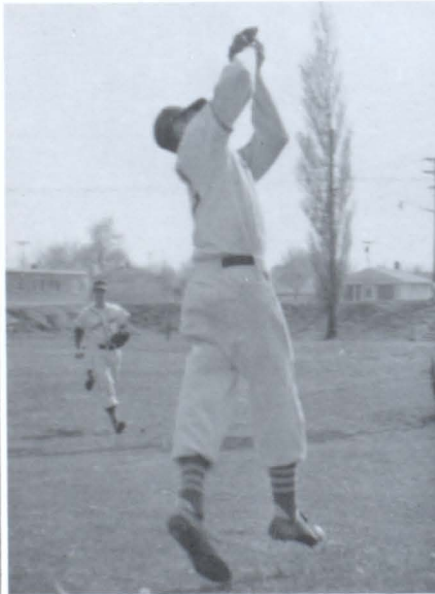
