Foreign languages here have become very popular. Two years of Latin and two years of Spanish were offered this year. Next year a third year of Spanish and a third year of Latin will be added to our curriculum.

Offered in science are Physics, Chemistry, General Science, and Biology which is required of all students. The interest in science has increased, and the classes are growing each year. But with our new science laboratory which was constructed this year, facilities will be adequate.
