




new dimensions open gateways that lead to pathways of understanding


a face that is still changing.




this year was one of heartbreaks and excitement for all woodmen fans. the football team, sporting their new green and gold colors, finished the season with great determination for a bigger and better future.

it work, to improve on what exists and being able to say, "i helped, i belong, i'm involved," are a stamp of approval, a necessity for students.




seem to bring on a sense of accomplishment. when an honor is awarded the work that has been dones seems small compared to what it produces.

happenings stir inevitable emotions, delight the participant and audience and cause momentous dimensions










people, working together on common interests, united by common goals and common talent, form groups.



aside from all these problems, the hallways are still filled with the same exciting jargon of the students because of the understanding and cooperation among friends.






Being able to speak foreign language is an asset to anyone and many colleges also require a foreign language for admission. A student may take anywhere from one to four years at Greenwood. Most take just one or two, but those who are really interested can become fluent in three or four years. The "romance" languages, Spanish, French, and Latin, are included in the curriculum.

Contrary to rumors, Latin is not a dead language, at least not here. Latin, from which many other languages are derived, helps with the spelling, and translation of other tongues.

French, one of the most musical languages, and rapid-fire Spanish give students a second speaking language. In third and fourth year French, Cindy Miles, Mary Miller and Ellen Davis listen closely to a translation while Anita Wojtowicz is distracted by something (left). During this year, the fourth year French class edited a newspaper very similar to the school newspaper, only in French. It consisted of such things as Peanuts cartoons, Dear Rachel (Dear Abby) letters, poetry and editorials. This proved to be an interesting and exciting project for the advanced class.

Study is necessary for all subjects, especially mathematics and science. Every branch of these subjects requires class work, concentration and help from the teacher. Prealgebra and basic math, designed to prepare the student to study algebra, reinforce the fundamentals learned in junior high math. Algebra, geometry, physical science, and biology, college-prep courses, are taken by most students. Only those who




glee clubs take up slack in music department


The library is an invaluable source of reference, and also a haven of study. Although there is always someone there studying, it is most crowded near the end of the semester when term papers and other major projects are







His times were: 100 yard dash --: 10.6, 220--1:23.5, and 440--:52.7. Sophomore Brad Napier set a record in the 880-yard dash with a flash of 2:04.1. 





anxious homecoming candidates await parade




















screaming boosters give total support





Activities during the year include performances at band days, home football and basketball games, local parades and State Fair Band Day.











