

It may not be Mt. Everest you climb today


It may just be getting over that little hump in the road that is impeding your progress toward a goal.

Not everything you do in a day may seem like an adventure--But the events of each day can total the greatest adventure of all--LIFE!





As the curtain rises, aspiring young actors and actresses launch into one of the most daring adventures of their high school years. But a musical production of "My Fair Lady" is no different.



Girls showed their skill with the basketball and volleyball as both teams captured county titles.


A disappointing varsity basketball season ended in a visible lack of school spirit.


The wrestling season closed with Greenwood holding both the county and sectional titles.

# Woodmen go 7-3

Neither rain, nor sleet, nor dark of night (remember the second annual Center Grove blackout) kept the Varsity Football team from capturing the title "County Champs" repeating their 7-3 record.

With a team made up of 17 seniors, the Woodmen finished third in the conference losing to only Plainfield and Speedway. Jeff Ferguson, senior, was the leading conference defensive player for the second straight year with 219 defensive points. Bill Williams, senior, was fifth and Rocky Byrum, junior, was eighth behind Ferguson. Dave Vleck, senior, led offensive scoring in the County with sixty points.


Vleck was voted MVP and overall there were few in offense or defense."

Neely Award as Most Valuable Lineman. Williams received the Rick Machledt award for mental attitude.


Greenwood opened the season with their first overtime play, winning 6-3 over Franklin. Using the wishbone option, the Woodmen charged on to defeat county rivals Center Grove, 46-6, and Whiteland 8-6, another overtime. Holding Decatur, Danville, and Franklin Central scoreless. The defense gave up only 9.2 points per game, while the offense scored 18.7 points a game.



The team was led by Frank Fish, who was voted the Most Valuable Runner and Most Improved Runner. Frank was also a member of the 1500-mile club the only member of the team to acquire this distinction. Frank was followed by John Fouts, the sole harrier in the 500-mile club.


# Netmen end on win





## Varsity suffers 2-19 season





The Varsity basketball season was a rebuilding one for the young and inexperineced Woodmen, as they finished with a 2-19 record.



### Reserves lose 5-13

The Reserves finished the season with a 5-13 record. Coach Mike Walsman said that the record does not indicate the type of season the team had. "Our offensive average was 38.2 points per game, while our defense gave up only 46.3 points per game, for a difference of 8.1." Leading scorer and rebounder was Randy Walker with 7.1 points per game and 85 rebounds. Tab Boaz led assists with 19. Most of the team will be returning as 12 were sophomores and 3 juniors. Coach Walsman said the team could be characterized by "the following traits: excellent hustle most of the time, good attitude in that they always continued to look forward to improve, 100% effort on the floor and in practice, and pride in themselves."

Both the A and B team had a hard season this year because they were shorter than their competition and they got off to a bad start during the season. But after they got started, they played hard never giving up when the going got rough. Many of the games were close in scoring, but the Freshmen Woodmen couldn't overcome the odds.

The A-Team finished with a 3-14 losing streak. The leading field goal scorer was Brian Malson with 44% and Mark Veach with 43%.

Leading in free throws were Brian Malson with 66% and Bobby Harris with 57% from the charity stripe. Leading in rebounds were Brian Malson with 85, Jim Wheat with 76, and Duane Waite with 60. All together the team made 33% of their field goals, 53% of their free throws, and made 382 rebounds.

The B-Team finished the season with a 2-12 record. Leading in field goals for the season were Duane Waite and Mike Fasig both with 50% and Tony Julian with 38%. Leading in free throws were Duane Waite, Don Foley, and Matt Wentworth all with 50% from the line. The leading scorer was Mark Tinkle with 55 points. 



# Grapplers pin wins








## Matmen take victories






County Champions!

#### **Reseves win**




## Girls cap County Y-ball.


# Science






Display cases were filled with clothing made in beginning and advanced clothing classes. The smell of cookies or garlic bread baking, and the unusual special occassion cakes were results.




some Saturdays.





# Classof'74 Adventure






## Y rite of Port Prom


